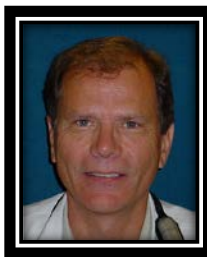

**Alan Dal Pra, MD**  
*Miami Cancer Institute*

Dr. Alan Dal Pra is Assistant Professor and Associate Director of Clinical Research Program at the Department of Radiation Oncology at the University of Miami, Miller School of Medicine. He is Medical Director of Radiation Oncology at The Lennar Foundation Medical Center in Coral Gables. He specializes in Genitourinary and Thoracic Oncology.

Dr. Dal Pra earned his Medical Degree at the Federal University of Rio Grande do Sul and has residency training in Radiation Oncology at the Federal University of Health Sciences of Porto Alegre, Brazil. He has postdoctoral training/fellowships in Genitourinary Oncology at McGill University and at the Princess Margaret Cancer Centre, University of Toronto, Canada where he completed a Clinician-Scientist Training Program. Dr. Dal Pra's research focus on clinical and translational research in Genitourinary cancers.

He is the principal investigator of an international multicenter trial in Europe and investigator or co-investigator of several prospective studies. Dr. Dal Pra is the recipient of numerous research grants and has authored or coauthored articles appearing in Nature, Nature Genetics, European Urology, Lancet Oncology, Clinical Cancer Research, Red Journal and other peer-reviewed journals. He serves as ad-hoc reviewer for several high-profile journals and as Associate Editor for Frontiers in Genitourinary Oncology and The British Journal of Radiology.



**Nestor Ricardo Villamizar, MD**  
*Miami Cancer Institute*

Dr. Nestor Villamizar, Assistant Professor of Surgery in the Division of Thoracic Surgery in the DeWitt Daughtry Family Department of Surgery and The University of Miami Miller School of Medicine and the Sylvester Comprehensive Cancer Center. Dr. Villamizar obtained his medical degree from Pontificia Universidad Javeriana in Bogota, Colombia, recognized as one of the leading centers in the country. His postgraduate education included three years of research in cardiothoracic surgery at Duke University Medical Center. He also completed his residency in general surgery at Duke University Medical Center, where he trained under Dr. Thomas D'Amico, a leader in minimally invasive thoracic surgery. Dr. Villamizar completed

his fellowship in cardiothoracic surgery at the Brigham and Women's Hospital, Harvard Medical School. His training included all aspects of general thoracic surgery: tumors of the lung, esophagus, airway, pleura, chest wall and mediastinum, paraesophageal hernias, anti-reflux surgery, esophageal motility disorders, thoracic outlet syndrome, tracheal stenosis and tracheobronchomalacia.

Dr. Villamizar is a member of the Society of Thoracic Surgeons. His research has been presented at several national meetings, and he has numerous publications in high impact journals. His main interest is minimizing surgical pain and complications, the majority of his surgeries are being done robotically. He is the Director of the Sylvester Lung Cancer Screening Program and the Associate Program Director of the Cardiothoracic Surgery Residency Program.

Following this, Dr. Sandoval Sus joined Moores Cancer Center at the University of California San Diego as a postdoctoral research fellow in the research group of Dr. Thomas J. Kipps and Dr. Januario Castro, where he focused on Phase I/II translational clinical trials in chronic lymphocytic leukemia (CLL).

After short tenure as clinical instructor at his University in Colombia in early 2010, he completed an internal medicine internship and residency at the University of Miami/Jackson Memorial Hospital. Dr. Sandoval Sus then was internal medicine chief resident at the VA Hospital in Miami, before moving to Tampa and completing a hematology and medical oncology fellowship at the University of South Florida/H. Lee Moffitt Cancer & Research Center. There he also served as chief fellow and was in charge of the academic curriculum. After graduating from fellowship, he joined Moffitt Cancer Center as an assistant member in the department of malignant hematology & cellular therapy as part of a new strategic partnership between MCC and Memorial Hospital System.

Dr. Sandoval's professional interests are in patient-focused care of all hematological malignancies, with a special emphasis in both indolent and aggressive lymphoid tumors, as well as in plasma cell disorders such as multiple myeloma including stem cell transplantation. He is also very interested in the design and conduction of early phase clinical trials, medical education and health disparities in malignant hematology.
